Topic: Hybridizing Phrags

Speaker: Earl Bailey

8:00 pm February 8, 2010 Atlanta Botanical Garden, Day Room

Earl Bailey retired from the University of Alabama in 1991 as Professor of Aerospace Engineering, where his specialty was Airplane Flight Control. He and his wife Phyllis, a former music teacher, live on a farm on the Little Cahaba River south of Birmingham, AL.

Together they formed ORCHIDbabies, LLC in 2002 after 8 years of orchid hobby growing in a 9 x 12 greenhouse. Another greenhouse, laboratory, and office was added in 2001, and the decision was to specialize in Lady Slippers – both Phragmipediums and Paphiopedilums. They now offer a complete line of new Paph and Phrag species and hybrids. Earl is the grower and runs their seed lab, and Phyllis does the bookkeeping and website. So far they have registered about 27 new Phrag and Paph hybrids, and their customers have received three AOS awards.

Their Phrag breeding program is focused on compact Phrags, and the Paph breeding program on brachypetalum and parvisepalum hybrids. Three years ago miniature orchids was added to their inventory, and they have many from all over the world available for sale.

AtOS Ribbon Winners and Notes January 2010

Class I – Cattleya Alliance

Blue- Cattleya Grace Kako 'Forest Jewel' – Fred Missbach



Originally registered in 2007 as a Sophrolaeliocattleya, this vividly colored and beautifully formed miniature is now simply a Cattleya. With the publication of Genera Orchidacearum Vol. 5 in 2009, all the species involved in this hybrid's genealogy that were once either Laelia or Sophronitis have been absorbed into Cattleya based on extensive studies on the genetic level. The brilliant Cattleya (formerly Sophronitis) coccinea appears as a parent on side and great-grandparent on the other and is far and away the most dominant player in the overall look of this bright red beauty. With luck, the species making up the other three eighths of its family tree also lend some adaptability to our warm southern climate. In general, hybrids with a high percentage of *C. coccinea* in them prefer to be watered just before the media becomes totally dry, but at the same time are quite intolerant of stale, soggy conditions and can experience rapid rotting of the roots once the mix begins to break down. Therefore it is wise to use a media that is made up of fairly large pieces so that drainage is perfect and air can get down to the bottom of the pot. Because of the small stature of these hybrids, you should base the need to repot not on whether or not the plant is overgrowing the edge of its container, but on the condition of the planting mix.

Class II - Cymbidium Alliance

Blue - Dendrobium thyrsiflorum - Lynne Gollob



A well flowered specimen of *Dendrobium* thrysiflorum is certainly worthy of a blue ribbon. And, since the spectacular blooms last in good condition for only about a week, perhaps two if kept cool, showing off the results of years of good culture also requires a bit of luck! The species originates from a widespread area of Southeast Asia, where it tends to grow in mountainous

regions near 4000 to 5000 feet above sea level. Here it receives abundant rainfall just after blooming in the spring until late fall, when rainfall becomes scarce, but the humidity remains high. In late winter, the humidity drops and the plants experience a two month dry period, and cooler nights, that help induce blooming. Growing conditions that mimic this cycle of wet and dry are required to successfully grow and flower *Den. thyrsiflorum*. In the last 125 years this species has been used just 12 times to produce registered hybrid offspring.

Class IV - Epidendrum Alliance

Oncidium Twinkle is a well loved primary hybrid of two miniature species, Onc. cheirophorum and Onc.ornithorhyncum registered by Moir back in 1958. Both parents are fragrant and this trait is definitely passed on to this orchid, which can offer many hundreds of long lasting blooms on small, bushy panicles during the cooler months from fall to spring, with occasional bloom at other times as well. The first parent listed is yellow while the

second is rose to violet, and some clones of *Onc*. Twinkle can be one of these colors, while the vast majority are cream colored with an orange lip callus. A well grown specimen can produce up to 2,000 flowers while still in a four to six inch pot. Keeping your plant well drained, well watered, with medium light (and definitely not any direct sunlight), and good humidity will produce vigorous growth and help keep leaf spotting at bay.

Class VIII – Vanda Alliance Blue – *Ascocenda* Princess Mikasa 'Sapphire' AM/AOS – Gene Gadilhe



This beautiful hybrid originated in Thailand in 1983 and individual clones can vary from royal purple to violet. The *Adcocentrum* component of its pedigree is provided though *Asctm. curvifolium*. Though 3 generations back in its family tree, this species still contributes to the plant size, color intensity, and roundness of the flowers. The hue is in large part taken from *V. coerulea*, which appears as both an immediate parent and further back in the family tree as well. Culture should be that as for

regular *Vanda* hybrids – bright to very bright light, warm temperatures, plenty of water and fertilizer while actively growing and somewhat less in winter.

Class IX – Miscellaneous

Blue – *Lycaste* Sunray 'Adeyaka' AM/AOS – Fred Missbach



Lycaste skinneri figures in as one parent in each of the 3 most recent generations of this hybrid's ancestry, which essentially gives that species over 95% of its genetic makeup. It is not surprising then that the look of the flower is fairly indistinguishable from a good example of Lyc. skinneri. However, the small genetic contribution of three other species is significant in that it appears to be enough to permit a good deal more warmth tolerance. Lyc. skinneri comes from cloud forest habitats at fairly high elevations in Central America and does not tolerate summer temperatures of 80 degrees or above for any length of time, and needs to cool to at least 60 at night. Lycaste prefer filtered light, with plenty of water and fertilizer in summer, combined with excellent drainage, and less water in winter when they rest and lose some or all of their leaves. The foliage can be susceptible to fungal diseases, so good air movement is helpful. Flowers are normally produced one per inflorescence from the base of a

mature, usually bare, pseudobulb just before, or concurrent with the new season's growth. Some species will produce many inflorescences with each mature bulb, but *Lyc. skinneri* commonly produces only one.

Lycaste macrophylla x skinneri (syn. virginalis) – Maureen Pulignano



This beautifully flowered hybrid should be registered, but coming up with a name for it is a bit of a challenge because both species involved have absorbed other species over the years that were previously described separately. Thus, four different registrations have occurred that under the current accepted nomenclature set forth by Kew, would be considered the hybrid of *Lycaste macrophylla* x *virginalis*. They would be *Lyc*. Balliae (1896), *Lyc*. Schoenbrunnensis (1896), *Lyc*. G.S. Ball (1900), and *Lyc*. Robin (1999). How this plant should have been entered I will leave for someone else to untangle! See my comments above on typical culture for *Lycaste*.
